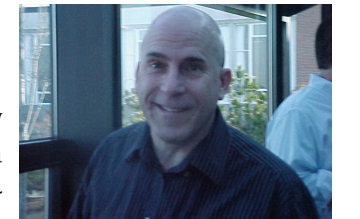

Rotary In The News...Cape Cod Times

Itzhak Perlman was afflicted with polio when he was four. Now 60 years later he 's helping to rid the world of the disease.

The celebrated final tests performed last night with the New York Philharmonic in a special concert at Lincoln Center The sponsor Rotary International is in the midst of a campaign to raise \$200 million to fight the disease which can cause paralysis or death.

With the development of vaccines, the number of polio cases has gone from 350,000 in 1988 to about 2000 as of three

years ago, according to World Health Organization figures.

Last year only four countries Afghanistan and India, Nigeria and Pakistan had cases of the disease according to the WHO.

There's absolutely no excuse for anybody getting polio at this day and age, Perlman said.
